

Called to Care for All

We are called to care for all, we care for people like $\ensuremath{\mathsf{M.D.}}$

M.D. is a mother of three adult daughters and a 17-year-old daughter, and a grandmother of seven. During the COVID-19 crisis, her family decided to stay with her so they all could be safe. However, her adult daughters were all laid off, with the children are all out of school, meaning there were 13 people living in the house. M.D. found out that she had cancer on top of having suffered a stroke and seizures. In May, she fell through her back porch causing severe lymphedema in her right foot. In August the kitchen cabinet and air vent fell on her head resulting in hospitalization and rehab for about two months. In addition to that, there are a number of house repairs needed. During all this time, Deaconess nurse has been by her side, helping her with medical problems and getting support on food, household items and financial support from various resources.

In December, while Deaconess Nurse Ministry worked with the food pantries, United Way and 100 Neediest Cases to get help for her family, they had to find a new place to live, but do not have the money to put down a deposit.

With the help of anonymous donors, Deaconess Nurse Ministry was able to help her with a deposit on a new house and pay for utilities that were months behind. She also got a check donation from 100 Neediest Cases. The nurse worked with their donors to get them furniture and household items, along with a good number of gifts for Christmas.

M.D. and her family are so grateful for Deaconess Nurse Ministry and loves to tell people how our nurse, Reta, and Deaconess Nurse Ministry has brought a Christmas miracle to their family.

Thank you for the critical role you are playing in this work, through your prayers and through your support of Deaconess Nurse Ministry. In 2021, we look forward to helping more people like M.D. thrive.



J.T. A Deaconess nurse, spent a couple months helping him move into an apartment with St Raymond's Apartments, including the application and interview process. J.T is now living in a beautiful one bedroom, affordable, clean and safe home, leaving behind drug-infested neighborhoods, and a one room boarding house with a hole in the ceiling that allowed weather elements in.

Good Samaritan Fund

The Good Samaritan Fund through Deaconess Nurse Ministry provides financial support for UCC active and retired clergy and their partners/spouses who reside in the Missouri Mid-South and Illinois South Conference. Deaconess Nurse Ministry assumes no financial liability or fund-raising responsibility for this program and only the Good Samaritan Fund will be utilized.

In 2020, with the Good Samaritan Grant, Deaconess Nurse Ministry was able to help 14 clergy members with emergency assistance and gap assistance, with the total amount of \$50,694.71.

We were honored to care for former clergy with counseling and wellness treatment, with nursing home cost, and with rent and utilities assistance. The grant also allows us to provide emergency assistance for those who had lost a significant amount of income due to COVID-19.

We are proud that our care is extended beyond nursing. We thank God for this gift which allows us to help our fellow clergy and follow our mission, care for all.

United Way Partnership

Even though our partnership did not start until 2021, Deaconess Nurse Ministry has been working to support our community during the COVID-19 Crisis since March of 2020. Through our partnership, Deaconess Nurse Ministry was able to help numerous people like T.G. not only to care for their health and wellness but also to help with food, housing, rent and utilities assistance.

A series of unfortunate events and circumstances beyond T.G. and her husband 's control have made them homeless. They have been evicted from their apartment and lost their car due to loss of income and inability to make payments. They have no furniture or household items and are unable to afford food or clothing. In March 2019, they were attacked while leaving a restaurant. Her husband suffered a broken cheek/eye socket and two broken ribs, and T.G was left with severe bruises. About a week later, they were simply going to the store when they were caught in the middle of a gunfight. They were not hit, but everything around them was riddled with bullets. This left T.G. with severe PTSD and ended up in the hospital for 5 days. About 3 weeks after the shooting, T.G. fell forward off the curb and broke both her feet in multiple locations. Because of her lost mobility, T.G. lost her job. Her husband's small business suffered as he took off to take care of her.










95% of seniors in all of our programs reduced their falls by working with a nurse on fall prevention.



2020 was a most unexpected and difficult year for all of us, all over the world. We started the year with hope, plans and new resolutions, but the pandemic hit us hard. Together, we offer free medical care to the uninsured and underinsured in the St. Louis and their surrounding area. Clients receive free care regardless of income or background. We provide physical and spiritual care, as well as financial, housing, utilities and food assistance.

Another wonderful program we were able to start with the grants from St. Louis City and St. Louis Country was Circle of Friends



online. We gave out iPads to clients who are high risk and isolated. They were able to communicate with our nurses and their group of friends on a weekly basis. They were able to talk to their family members during Thanksgiving and Christmas. It was a blessing to the clients.
